

The purpose of this panel is to provide an overview of how bushfires, floods, the COVID-19 pandemic and other natural disasters can impact the kidney community, particularly those needing dialysis or transplantation. We are interested in education related to emergency plans and practical advice to prepare for disasters for those who undergo dialysis at a hospital, satellite unit or at home. Also, any implications for transplant recipients and donors.

Kidney patients represent more than 850 million people worldwide and are particularly affected by disastrous events as their ability to access proper diagnostic services, treatments, and care may be hindered.

Preparing for unforeseen events is key for kidney patients. Policymakers need to implement integrated health strategies that prioritize prevention, early detection, and management of #NCDs.

In times of emergency, healthcare services need to provide chronic disease patients with equitable and appropriate access to care.

World Kidney Day calls for governments to include emergency preparedness plans in managing, detecting, and preventing kidney disease.

Patients should plan for emergencies by preparing an emergency kit that includes food, water, medical supplies and medical records.

The **Home Dialysis Association**, now known as **DATA** was formed from a group of dialysis patients and friends at Austin Hospital in May 1973.

#### 1st meeting 3th May 1973

The 1st general meeting of renal patients was held at the Austin Hospital. The suggestion was to form an Association. An Interim Committee was elected, consisting of Dr. Miach, Mr. Sutherland, Mrs. Tait, Mr. Thomas & Mr.Millen

#### 2nd meeting 1st July 1973

Recommendations proposed by the committee.

- 1 That the Association be called "Dialysis Patients Association".
- 2. That the office bearers be, President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer and 5 committee members.
- 3 That the meeting place should be at Austin Hospital.
- 4. That a sub-committee be appointed to prepare a draft constitution.
- 5. That each meeting should have a guest speaker.
- 6. That membership fees should be:

PATIENT (NON PENSIONER) \$2.00 p.a.

PENSIONER PATIENT 50c p.a.

FRIENDS & RELATIVES \$1.00 p.a.

# Family Update from Mark Wolfenden

We're delighted to be able to provide an update from the father of two of our kidney kids plus some great news on a bio artificial kidney that the family supports.

Sadly, after two and a half years our eldest son, Sebastian (Seb) lost his transplanted kidney in February of this year. It was very challenging for him, but he's now settled into life on haemodialysis at home extremely well. It did take a few months to learn how to do home haemodialysis, yet thanks to the supervision of his 'second family' of renal nurses who went above and beyond to care for him, he apparently broke all records getting up to speed with the machine and setting it up at home. Seb has adapted well to sleeping with the needles in his fistula, and because it's every other night, and over a longer duration (8 hours), he feels better and more energetic. He has part time work in a post production studio, where they add SFX into films and TV shows. It is a field he loves and has significant future potential, and he got his driver's licence this year too! We're very proud of our Seb, who continues to smile and embrace life fully.

Raph is charging on like a busy home schooled 11 year old – I'm (Mark) his math teacher, and Emily (his mother) language arts -we follow an excellent American curriculum. It means Raph's relatively protected from bugs (his kidney function is now down to about 20% and treatment for rejection is high, meaning his immune system is heavily compromised). We're able to get away in the caravan in term time too, which is pretty cool. We've just returned from the Grampians where he completed a Bear Grylls survival course (don't panic, it was age appropriate – although he would happily fight a bear). He's got tons of social contact with cricket, tennis, sailing and a bunch of great kids in our neighbourhood. Raph is a real delight and doing well.

Kidney Project news. My Uncle Neil, Aunty Louise, and cousin, Eric Paton went to see Dr Shuvo Roy and team at UCSF to view the lab and check out the bio-artificial kidney (photo below- Eric is holding a prototype, Dr Roy is in the grey jacket, Neil & Louise are either side and Bo, one of the UCSF team, is on the far right. Both Neil and Eric have backgrounds in material technology (before retirement Neil was a top scientist with NASA and Rockwell; best known as one of the designers and engineers of the tile for the space shuttle and Eric lectures at the local university in San Luis Obispo on material). In italics below is Neil's summary of the lab visit.

In terms of funding, as a group of family and friends, we've managed to raise almost \$35,000 AUD so far. This is truly incredible, and we are so grateful for everyone's ongoing support. As Neil says in his summary below 'The clinical trial phase is expensive and time consuming.' Nevertheless, Dr Roy remains 100% committed to the project and we remain committed to help him and his team.

From Neil: As you know we visited UCSF yesterday and spent over an hour talking to Dr Roy and his team working on the Kidney Project. Dr Roy was very friendly and open about the project, and was clearly excited about the progress being made. The artificial Kidney they are developing consists of two chambers. A primary chamber with a silicon filter and a secondary chamber containing cultured live kidney cells.

The silicon filter in the primary chamber consists of an array of 10 nanometer pores spaced 400 nanometers apart etched into a thin silicon wafer, using photolithography methods developed by the semiconductor chip industry. In testing the filter works well but the spacing between the pores needs to be reduced to improve the efficiency. Current efforts include improving the packaging and refining the filter design. A prototype of the artificial kidney was tested in a pig about a year ago, and the next step is to run more extensive tests of the improved design in several pigs. According to Dr Roy, clinical trials in humans are at least three years away, but this will require a significant increase in funding levels..


